Dr. Powell joined BC CAHS as the CEO in May 2014, and has been involved in the organization in various ways; as voluntary member of the Board of Directors from 2003 to 2014 and the BC CAHS Board Chair from 2012 to 2013.

"Jim's most recent contribution was to successfully spearhead and secure funding for the creation of an aquatic animal health wet lab which will pave the way for BC CAHS to enter into additional aquatic animal health research and environmental monitoring in BC.
